GIANT VIDEO GAMES TO INVADE COMISKEY PARK TUESDAY

CHICAGO, June 4, 1982--The world's first video game to be projected on a giant screen will be played just before next Tuesday's (June 8) White Sox-Oakland A's baseball game. The game, called "The Incredible Wizard" from Astrocade, will be played on the 24X35-foot Diamond Vision screen at Comiskey park just before the game, at approximately 7:15 P.M.

The Incredible Wizard is similar to the popular "Wizard of Wor" arcade video game and is considered "the most exciting new video game in the world," according to Astrocade vice-president Ray George. Astrocade, which is headquartered in Columbus, Ohio, is in Chicago this week to promote its new video games, especially The Incredible

McCormick Place June 6-9.

The company will also unveil its "Conan" video game to there, which Mr. George claims is the first video game to spin off from a movie. Conan, which will be available at stores this Fall, features a miniature Arnold Schwarzenegger-look alike figure. The player can move him around the screen, using a club to kill various fiendish monsters. "It's a fantastic way to release aggression," says Mr. George.

Astrocade plans to hold video game contests on Comiskey Park's giant Diamond Vision screen at all 48 home games, with prizes for kids 19 and under, including video games and a \$2500 scholarship fund for the season's highest score.

Right now, the highest scorer in The Incredible Wizard is Michael Kohler, 15, of Naperville, who claims a 17,000 score at level 3, and will be demonstrating his prowess at the Consumer Electronics Show.
